Background – TEA-21

- Began with TEA-21 authorized a seat belt incentive grant program based on seat belt use rate
- September 1, 1998 Interim Final Rule Uniform Criteria for State Observational Surveys of Seat Belt Use (63 FR 46389)
- March 14, 2000 Final Rule adopting Uniform Criteria



Background – SAFETEA-LU

- SAFETEA-LU new administrative requirements for Section 402
 - Certifications and assurances: States conduct annual seat belt survey according to Uniform Criteria
 - -Implementing guidance for Section 406: surveys using the Uniform Criteria would serve as basis for performance provision of grant program



Final Rule – April 1, 2011

- April 1, 2011 Final Rule published amending the regulation establishing uniform criteria for designing and conducting surveys, procedures of obtaining NHTSA approval of designs and new form for reporting use rates
- Revised 1998 Uniform Criteria so that future surveys will give States more accurate data to guide their occupant protection programs
- April 2012 amended final rule to allow for extensions



Background – MAP-21

- MAP-21 States conduct seat belt surveys as part of Section 402 certification and assurances, and
- Data from survey used to determine the way in which a State applied for Section 405(b) occupant protection grant funds



Background – FAST Act

 Continue to conduct annual belt survey in accordance with the Uniform Criteria

 NCSA verified seat belt use rates from annual survey will be used to determine if a State applies as a high seat belt use rate State or a lower seat belt use rate State



Why re-select observation sites?

• To ensure <u>accurate</u> and <u>representative</u> measurements of seat belt use at the State level

 To allow all in-scope roads (where the population is driving) to have a chance of inclusion in the State sample



Uniform Criteria §1340.12

- (a) Re-selection of observation sites. States shall re-select observation sites using updated sampling frame data, as described in §1340.5(a), no less than once every five years.
- (b) Re-selection submission deadline. States shall submit updated sampling frame data meeting the requirements of §1340.5(a) for NHTSA approval no later than March 1 of the re-selection year.




Timeline – States due for site re-selection in 2017

Best Practices – Statisticians & Design Plan Review

- States must work with statisticians experienced in complex (multi-stage) surveys (see §1340.8(c))
- State statisticians will be responsible for reviewing and understanding their NHTSAapproved seat belt survey design plan



Best Practices – Data for site re-selection

NHTSA will provide roadway segment data for each State

List of road segments by county and road-type



Best Practices – Re-selection Protocol

- This is <u>NOT</u> a re-design
- States are required to re-select observation sites in the counties where they currently conduct seat belt survey observations
- Identify and apply allowable exclusions (rural local roads in non-MSA counties) to roadway segment data



NHTSA Support

Provide a Guidance Document

- Set up a SharePoint site with road segment data
- Review/evaluate road segment samples



State Submission Requirements

- Certification that the State applied current design specifications
- List of sampled roadway segments with their associated probabilities of selection
- Earlier submissions are recommended to allow time for review/implementation



NHTSA Review

 Review the re-selected road segment submissions

 Notification from NHTSA's Office of Regional Operations and Program Delivery



States' Role and Responsibilities

- States must use a survey statistician to perform their road segment re-selection (See §1340.8(c))
- NHTSA is not able to provide technical support/consulting to the States for their reselection
